The campaign is culturally grounded in the voices of Native people and includes information on prevention, treatment, harm reduction, recovery, overdose prevention, and reducing stigma .The campaign is informed by interviews, focus groups, and discussions with Tribes, Urban Indian organizations, the American Indian Health Commission Opioid Response Workgroup, and AI/AN people across Washington. All materials are free.

Presenters: <u>Vicki Lowe</u> is the Executive Director of the American Indian Health Commission. Vicki co-leads the Al/AN opioid response workgroup which provides ongoing guidance to the campaign. <u>Megan Hathaway</u> is a research director with Desautel Hege and has a master's degree in public health communication and marketing from George Washington University. Megan is co-lead in the campaign's development and adapting it for different communities. <u>Lucilla Mendoza</u> is the Behavioral Health Administrator in the Office of Tribal Affairs at the Health Care Authority. Lucy is the lead on this campaign for HCA.
